The Word of God is powerful, living, and active (Hebrews 4:12). Jesus used Scripture to counter the devil’s temptations in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11), demonstrating the power of God’s Word in spiritual battles.
7. **Prayer:** While not a piece of armour, Paul concludes with the importance of prayer: “And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests” (Ephesians 6:18).
